About Big Five Community Services, Inc.

Big Five Community Services, Inc. is a non-profit 501(c)(3) Oklahoma corporation that operates as a Community Action Agency (CAA). Governed by a Tripartite Board of Directors consisting of 15 members, Big Five oversees a variety of programs and services designed to support individuals and families in need across Oklahoma.

The organization's history is deeply rooted in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, which laid the foundation for Community Action Programs as part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's "War on Poverty." The Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) was created to support these initiatives, and in 1966, several Southern and Southeastern Oklahoma counties launched their local efforts to combat economic and social deprivation.

In 1969, the Indian Nation Community Action Foundation, Inc. was formed, covering ten counties. Two years later, in 1971, five of these counties merged to establish Big Five Community Services, Inc. This merger created what would become the largest rural Community Action Agency in Oklahoma in terms of the population served. After the OEO was disbanded in 1974, the Community Services Administration (CSA) assumed oversight until 1981, when the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program took its place. Despite funding reductions and the elimination of some programs over the years, Big Five has remained steadfast in its mission. Rather than focusing solely on temporary assistance, Big Five continues to address the root causes of poverty, working to create lasting change for individuals, families, and communities.





We partner with the Oklahoma Housing Finance Agency (OHFA) for development funding and comply with all OHFA regulations to ensure fair and consistent practices for both current and prospective tenants.

Head Start is a comprehensive childcare program dedicated to providing quality services for children and their families. The program addresses the emotional needs of each child on an individual basis and works to identify and support any learning disabilities before the child enters public school.

Head Start offers medical, dental, nutritional, and mental health services, ensuring that children receive well-rounded care.

Developmentally appropriate learning activities are designed to build self-confidence, encourage independence, and promote social competence. Children engage in a variety of experiences that foster cognitive, physical, and emotional growth.

Big Five Head Start proudly serves families in the following Oklahoma counties: Alfalfa, Beaver, Blaine, Bryan, Canadian, Carter, Cimarron, Coal, Custer, Dewey, Ellis, Garfield, Grant, Harper, Hughes, Kingfisher, Love, Major, Okfuskee, Pontotoc, Texas, Woods, and Woodward.

Funded enrollment for Big Five Head Start is **1,158** children. For the 2022-2023 school year, Big Five Head Start served **1,258** children and **1,169** families. Average Daily enrollment was 85%. According to the United States Census Bureau Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE) program, 18.9% of Oklahoma children under the age of five are living at or below the poverty level.

Audit:

Big Five is audited annually by an independent auditor to analyze the financial health of the agency. Big Five's audit had no concerns. There were no questioned costs in the latest audit.

Results of the Most Recent Review by the Secretary:

As of 1/5/2023, the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) conducted a monitoring review of Big Five Community Services, Inc., Head Start Program. Big Five had one area of non-compliance in standard 1302.12 (c), Determining, verifying, and documenting eligibility. It is being addressed in a corrective action plan.

Efforts to Prepare Children for Kindergarten:

Big Five Head Start is using Creative Curriculum and book study guides as the theory base for educational outcomes. As well as the High Reach Curriculum and ELQA (Early Literacy Quick Assessment) to meet the goals of Head Start Outcomes, State of Oklahoma Core Curricula, and the individual goals set by our school districts, where we have pre-school partnerships. Each of these curriculums is normed and validated and scientifically research-based. These curriculums provide developmentally appropriate learning activities for preschool children and encourage family engagement. In Family Engagement, we added "Love, Read and Learn" from the State Department of Education. Children are given the Brigance Development screening on the first day of school, followed by the Learning Accomplishment Profile-Diagnostic after 45 days in the classroom, again at mid-term, and a final assessment in April. This assessment identifies the child's strengths and weaknesses, providing a baseline for individualization and family involvement in the learning process. The ELQA (Early Literacy Quick Assessment) is given online three times a year, with individual reports printed for parents and monitored by the Education team. Year-end data will provide data for kindergarten success. This is a normed and validated assessment from the University of Oklahoma.

Resources, priorities, and concerns of the family, together with support services, enhance the family's capacity to meet the developmental needs of their child and prepare them for kindergarten. This is part of the school readiness plan and meets the Head Start Performance standards for Framework Outcomes and School Readiness.





The primary focus of Big Five's Health Promotion program is to inform and educate seniors on managing their own chronic disease or the chronic disease of a loved one.

<u>Big Five offers Tai Chi: Moving for Better Balance</u> to individuals age 60 and older living in Atoka, Bryan, Carter, Coal, Garvin, Johnston, Love, Marshall, Murray, and Pontotoc counties. This program helps older adults improve balance and reduce the risk of falling. Research shows that participants who complete the program are half as likely to fall and experience less fear of falling. Designed for older adults who can walk without assistive devices, the program teaches balance skills, proper body alignment, and smooth, coordinated movements.

<u>Big Five also offers A Matter of Balance (MOB)</u>, an evidence-based program designed to reduce the fear of falling and increase activity levels among community-dwelling older adults. The program consists of eight two-hour classes in small groups of 8–12 participants, led by trained coaches. MOB empowers participants to view falls as controllable, set activity goals, make small changes to reduce home fall risks, and engage in exercises that improve strength and balance.

Participants in these programs often experience improved physical health—such as greater strength, flexibility, and mobility—as well as enhanced mental health, including increased confidence, reduced fear, and less social isolation.






Outreach

The purpose of Outreach is to promote communication between the elderly in using community resources. Big Five Outreach will identify potential clients or their caregivers, make referrals to needed services, and encourage their use of existing services and benefits.

All individuals aged 60 and over are eligible for services. There are no mandatory fees for services. Older persons, however, are encouraged to make contributions to help defray the costs of services. Under current law, these contributions are used to expand services.



RX for Oklahoma

Big Five Community Services, Inc. assists individuals in Bryan, Carter, Coal, Love, and Pontotoc counties with access to free or low-cost prescription medications. Through this program, clients receive help completing the required applications for participating pharmaceutical companies.

This service is limited to maintenance medications and does not cover short-term or emergency prescriptions. All approved medications are mailed directly to the client or their prescribing physician. Big Five does not dispense medications or pay for prescriptions.

Public Transportation



SORTS provides reliable transportation for all transit needs, including rides to work, school, shopping, medical appointments, dining, and visiting friends. All vehicles meet ADA requirements, with wheelchair-accessible vans and buses available throughout our service area. We also comply with ADA standards for communication, offering operator-assisted relay services for individuals with hearing or speech impairments. Safety is our priority. All drivers undergo background checks, random drug and alcohol testing, and maintain clean driving records. Large bus operators hold a valid CDL with a passenger endorsement and a current medical card.

Our general hours of operation are 7:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. However, Sooner Ride and Work routes are available outside of these hours, including evenings and weekends. Additional public transportation services may also be scheduled beyond standard hours as needed, and all services are open to the public.


